Clean Up From the Holidays Safely – Both for the Environment and Your Protection



As the holidays approach, we want to advise all our customers to be proactive about recycling holiday shopping catalogs and taking care when recycling items that contain personal information.

Most junk mail, including solicitations and catalogues, can be recycled in residents' recycling bins. But remember to be careful when recycling sensitive information. Be sure to tear receipts, billing statements or credit card offers before placing them in your recycling bin and remember to put any loose shredded paper in a paper bag.

Any items that contain account numbers or Social Security numbers should be destroyed before disposal. In order to reduce your risk for identity theft – and also cut down on unwanted mail or solicitations – you can also opt out of receiving credit offers.
